<u>Note:</u> The targets for the final set of indicators could focus on reduction of disparities rather than some absolute standard that all neighborhoods should meet. While the reduction of disparities isn't great since all the neighborhoods could sink into poverty and the target will have been met. But with a focus on reducing disparities, attention is given to the neighborhoods that need support the most.
