**SUBJECT:** Measure O/ESEA – March Progress Report

This is the second Measure O/ESEA (Emergency Shelter and Enforcement Act of 2022) written progress report to the city council since ESEA became effective December 23, 2022.

The ESEA requires the city to collect data on the following efforts, and report on its progress to the city council every 30 days: 1) Providing emergency shelter space, 2) Eliminating encampments and unlawful camping.

1) Providing Emergency shelter space:

ESEA requires that by March 23, 2023, the city manager must identify and authorize at least 605 new emergency shelter spaces. The city can count any emergency shelter spaces authorized on or after December 31<sup>st</sup>, 2021. Below is a table enumerating the number of emergency shelter spaces identified and authorized by the city manager after this date.

2) Eliminating encampments and unlawful camping (in city-owned/public areas):

Since adoption of the City/County partnership agreement and ESEA taking effect, City/County outreach teams have focused outreach and engagement efforts in the following areas: X street corridor; Roseville Road; Dias Avenue; Setzer Mill/Front Street; Traction Avenue, 29<sup>th</sup> & C. Below is data related to City/County outreach team efforts in these areas as of preparation of this update:

In addition to City/County outreach efforts, the city’s Department of Community Response (DCR) along with Hope Cooperative also conducts daily outreach activities through the 311 system, special projects, and via weekly Multi Service Team (MST) activities with both the Downtown Sacramento and Midtown Partnership staff. Since December 6<sup>th</sup>, 2022, DCR and Hope Cooperative Outreach have enrolled 1,389 community members in the DCR HMIS program.
