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HOME CITY **UPDATES**

Council approved a new affordable housing project at the site of a former motel and mobile home park.

The lot is currently vacant but was the former home of the San Juan Motel. With that history, the project will be called the San Juan Apartment Complex.

113 units on Stockton Blvd; "The location of this affordable housing project is critical because it is on the most heavily used bus transit line in the entire county system," councilmember Eric Guerra told KCRA 3.

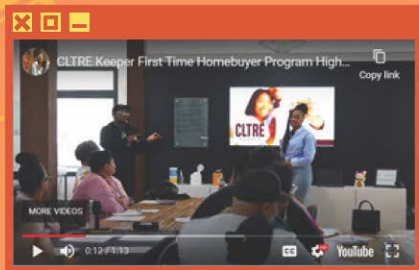
NEW AFFORDABLE HOUSING

Donner Field Senior Apartments on 4501 9th Avenue in Sacramento will serve residents over 55 years old who make less than 60% of the median income.



Sacramento city officials approved \$5 million for local home improvements as part of the UC Davis Aggie Square Community Benefits Agreement.

A total of **\$10 million** will be available for residents around the Stockton Boulevard corridor who could be affected by the Aggie Square project.



Funds will support housing stability activities:

- Rent and utilities costs
- Home repairs and improvements
- Eviction protections

What is **CLTRE** Keeper?

The CLTRE Keeper is an 8-week home buying program specifically designed for people within culturally rich neighborhoods. The goal of program is to provide community members with the knowledge, resources, and support they need to navigate the home buying process and become successful homeowners.



A four week program and paid internship; teaching young adults how to build Tiny Homes for the Community. Focused on neurodivergent learners and creating environments that challenge the traditional learning paradigm and utilize a diverse set of approaches to make sure each participant is given the tools to succeed.

EMERGENCY HOME REPAIR PROGRAM FOR INCOME-ELIGIBLE HOMEOWNERS

JUSTICE FOR NEIGHBORS

"The City wants to assist homeowners, who to no fault of their own, but due to health challenges, aging, limited income, or other legitimate circumstances are unable to perform repairs on their property that would otherwise render it substandard or dangerous," said Senior Deputy City Attorney Michael Benner.



City's Code and Housing Enforcement Chief Peter Lemos said, "We regularly observe households facing habitability challenges due to a lack of resources to address substandard and dangerous conditions. This program can help provide the resources to make the needed repairs and keep people in their homes."

ROCK THE BLOCK



"Rock the Block is an initiative that was started in Sacramento seven years ago, specifically, in the Oak Park neighborhood by Habitat for Humanity as an opportunity to make an investment over time in a community and see the impact by doing home repairs for low income and fixed income homeowners."
