**Statement of Purpose:** The course will provide the student with topics relating to patrol-based emergency responses during critical incident. The student will develop the necessary knowledge and skills to deal with high-risk encounters that they may be exposed to during patrol calls-for-service. Primary emphasis will be on decision making, predetermined plans, and equipment familiarization. The course consists of a hands-on, practical skills training for Sacramento Police Department Officers.
