

State of violent crime

- Both violent and property crimes significantly decreased between 1993 and 2019
- ♦ Gun violence across the United States has risen 30% in 2020 compared to 2019
- ♦ Violence in 2021 at least 12 large US. Cities hit an all-time high for homicides

- In line with Sacramento's goal of improving community trust while providing excellent public safety










Violent Crime Reduction Framework




Figure 1. Kernel Density (Old Method)




Figure 2. Optimize Hotspot (New Method)







Focused Deterrence Model What it Does: What it is:

- **♦ Identifies who is committing violence**
 - ♦ Criminal data
 - ♦ Social networks
 - Place Network Investigations
- **♦ Identifies where the violence is occurring**
- **Addresses** why the violence is occurring
 - ♦ Proximate and root causes

- * Holistic
- ♦ Resource intensive
- Involves Community as well as Law Enforcement partners
- Provides supportive services to high-risk individuals

Regional Law Enforcement Collaboration

Expanded partnership with the FBI (Enhanced crime analysis)
